VIKING VILLAGE VISITS








The More You Know...

At every Resident & Family Advisory Council Meeting (which are held every second month; dates are posted on the Family Information Boards), we ask residents how we can improve upon "resident-focused care" in their home. Suggestions made to date have included things such as noise dampening in the larger rooms with vaulted ceilings to improve resident hearing and reduce echoes; and better positioning of items in the resident bathrooms to enable more independence from capable residents. One thing that has come to light from this discussion topic is that Betel Home often already has one or more solutions available for residents to meet their accessibility needs. Also, the needs of each individual resident can be very unique to their circumstances, and the solution for one may not be the solution for all. Any resident who is having trouble with reaching something they use daily or would like to use independently should bring their concern to their Unit Nurse as soon as possible. Between the Clinical Nurse Manager, Rehab Assistant, and our dedicated maintenance team, there is likely something we can do or change to remedy the situation. It could be as simple as moving the bed to a different position in the room, installing a different style of toilet paper holder, or getting a longer extension for the call bell cord. If you

This is a heart-warming sight to see, but it can come with risks as well. Many residents in long-term care experience difficulties with chewing and swallowing. Difficulty swallowing is also known as "dysphagia" (dis-fay-jee-ah). This choking or aspiration (when food or fluids enters the lungs). In addition to choking concerns, many residents also have restricted diets related to sugar or salt intake, or may have allergies and sensitivities to certain ingredients. Not following the proper diet and texture can have adverse
